Youth and young adults submit short films in suicide prevention, mental health, and explore these topics through the lens of diverse cultures.




Submission Deadline: March 1, 2019

Learning Methodology

Directing Change integrates sound pedagogical principles into the filmmaking process so that participants are engaged via all methods of the "learning spectrum": to see, experience, discuss, and apply. Once created films are used in schools and communities to raise awareness and start conversations about these topics.

Directing Change - Key Findings

Directing Change is effective at:

- Increasing knowledge and skills
- Changing attitudes and behaviors related to mental illness and suicide prevention

"It is remarkable that significant findings persisted even months after the program had ended—with fielding of the survey among participants in the program 3 - 6 months after completing their film submissions"





Educational Resources

The Directing Change Program is an evaluated education program that can easily be integrated into classroom, club, or extracurricular activities.

Directing Change Overview

Submit 30-second or 60-second films in one of the following categories:

- Mental Health Matters (MHM)
- Suicide Prevention (SP)
- Through the Lens of Culture (MHM or SP)
- SanaMente (Spanish, 30-seconds)
- Animated Short (30-seconds)
- Walk in Our Shoes (60-seconds)

The contest is open to students in grades 6-12, youth and young adults ages 14 to 25

- All film teams need to identify an adult advisor to review the film.
- There is no limit on the number of submissions by participants, schools, or organizations.
- There is no limit on the number of people who can work on a film
 Submission Deadline: March 1, 2019

Create. Compete. Direct Change to Save Lives.







MONTEREY COUNTY PARTICIPATION

2017-2018 Program: Monterey County

- 6 films
- Salinas High School
- 15 students



Monterey County over the years:

- 72 students involved over the past six years
- 38 films created
- 3 schools involved:
 - Santa Catalina School
 - Gonzales High School
 - Salinas High School

Here are a few ways teachers have integrated Directing Change into classroom or after school activities:

Psychology Class:

- As a civics project students read the contest rules from website, brainstormed ideas, storyboarded, wrote dialog, contacted people to help (video teacher, admin, other teacher), filmed, edited.
- Total time = 5 class days prep, 3 class days to film, edit and submit film

• Film/Video Production Class:

- Students research facts, watched winning films on website, then answered discussion questions on mental health topics. Students completed a research assignment on the topic in addition to creating a film and were graded on both.
- Total time = 4 weeks (1 week dedicated to educating students on the topic).

PAL/Peer Assistant Leadership:

- Required class assignment. Students watched winning films, invited mental health guest speaker, and then were assigned to groups and given 2 weeks to create their film. Students' films were then screened to all students during advisory period.
- Total Time= Educating on topic: 5 hours. Working on project: 10 hours

Peer Leader After School Club:

- Students worked on creating films after school and during lunch time.
- Total Time= 20 hours

After School Leadership Class:

- Students worked in groups of 4 and worked on films during class time and after school. All of the films were graded for completion.
- Total Time= 3 weeks (12 hours)



2018 DIRECTING CHANGE AWARD CEREMONY

More than 1,200 guests attended the red carpet awards ceremony and top films screening in downtown Los Angeles on Tuesday, May 22nd to celebrate the achievement of young filmmakers across the state. Youth filmmakers from across California were given awards for their short films to raise awareness about mental health and suicide prevention.

Actress and mental health activist, Mädchen Amick, star of The CW's Riverdale, received the Directing Change Award of Excellence for Mental Health Advocacy to acknowledge her tireless efforts to raise awareness, fight stigma and increase mental health care access. Director and writer Lisa Klein was honored for THE S WORD, a documentary film about suicide that explores the shame and confusion contrasted with an emerging era of activism, recovery and hope.

More than 1,100 students from 15 Los Angeles-area middle and high schools filled the auditorium along with celebrity guests, including Hart Denton who presented the award to Amick, his "Riverdale" co-star, Eric Bigger from ABC's Bachelorette season 13 and "Bigger Talks" podcast host, and CeCe Valencia, on-air radio personality with Power 106.

Additional tips and ideas for integrating Directing Change in classroom or after school activities

- ✓ Offer as an extension to a script writing or creative writing lesson.
- ✓ Offer as extra credit with option to work on project outside and during class time.
- ✓ Offer as a final class project.
- Break students into teams and ask them to research topics, pick a category, and write script for a film. Have entire class vote for best script and have groups create films based on top voted scripts.
- Require as part of graded senior project and present films to entire school in a science fair type of format and also broadcast in each classroom.
